SUBJECT: Discussion Item for WASAG: Coastal Evacuation

We presently have a sea-lift capacity in the waters off
Viet-Nam of 58,000 (12 MSC charter vessels). Most are presently
in the vicinity of Vung Tau, relatively close to shore, and
some are picking up any Vietnamese who reach them by small
boat. We need to decide whether this is the best way to use
those ships, or whether they can somehow be employed to
allow for a more selective pickup of genuinely high-risk
Vietnamese. The problem will become more acute immediately
following the fall of the GVN, when the refugee airlift will
be ended but while many thousands of high-risk or relatively
high-risk Vietnamese are still able to use small coastal
vessels or short-range aircraft to escape.

<u>Options</u>

We have essentially four alternative courses of action:

- 1) Active posture: The MSC vessels would be deployed in the vicinity of likely egress routes and would actively patrol designated sectors. They would move toward any vessels they sight and take passengers aboard. (The ships would operate just beyond the three-mile limit.)
- 2) Close-in, but passive: The ships would again be spotted in the vicinity of egress routes, from Vung Tau to Phu Quoc, at or just beyond the three-mile limit. However

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
